



In the second part, the focus is on iconography, that is, on the codes of maps (titles, colors, allegories). Finally, the third part is dedicated to three interconnected subjects: maps, literature, and travel. Within each of these three parts, the offerings made to the reader are so varied and extensive that no one will be disappointed.

During the winter of 1943, British planes flew over German territory dropping thousands of leaflets on some cities in Germany. Those who had written this message were not British, but compatriots of those who received them. They urged German citizens to rebel against their own government. Their authors were members of a mysterious organization calling themselves "Die Weiße Rose" ("The White Rose"). All but one of them were extremely young.

In recent decades, unpublished testimonies have emerged, forgotten folders have been found, diaries that no one had read until now, and classified archives have been opened. All this has contributed to the revelation of the secret and fascinating world to which the members of The White Rose, as teenagers, belonged, without anyone knowing.

Transformed by these initiatory experiences, they emerged separately from the deep forests of Germany to embark together on a journey as unpredictable as it was dangerous in the most difficult time imaginable.

Ibon Zubiaur reconstructs the history of this political system and complements it with the vision of the protagonists through their letters, diaries, and memoirs. In addition to a precise historical analysis of the emergence, consolidation, and end of the censorship system, he selects and analyzes some novels—from authors such as Fritz Rudolf Fries, Alfred Wellm, Stefan Heym, Brigitte Reimann, Volker Braun, Christoph Hein, among others—that illustrate the disparity of fates that a book could face in those times.


This research seeks to restore the prominence that books should never have lost. How these books operated in a system of censorship and how this not only conditioned their reception but also their emergence. Contrary to the prejudice that the GDR only produced monotonous books, we will see that the literature of that country was characterized precisely by its plurality. The result was a very lively literature and, above all, receptive to the social tensions of its environment.

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IBON ZUBIAUR (Getxo, 1971) studied Psychology and piano, and obtained his doctorate with a thesis on the poetry of Cernuda. He has translated numerous authors from the former German Democratic Republic and classics such as Yeats, Wieland, Stifter, Joseph Roth, Siegfried Kracauer, Ludwig Hohl, or Hans Henny Jahnn, and is the author of editions such as *Pioneros de lo homosexual* (*Pioneers of Homosexuality*) (2007) and *Al otro lado del Muro. 

A DEFENSE OF HISTORY AS A DISCIPLINE

What is history? At some point in time, it was thought that it was a useless discipline, as if it were only ornamental knowledge. Investigating about the recent or remote past is not a hobby, it is a practical activity that helps the individual and the community. But history can't just tell people what they want to hear. The past is inert, fatal, something that cannot be reproduced. The past does not exist but vestiges remain, remnants of actions, traces of the past that are remembered with a current meaning, not always coinciding with what they had.

In this book, Justo Serna makes a defense of the historian's profession as a teacher and of history as a discipline, since the acquisition of a historical culture helps to know the kind of individuals we are or aspire to be.






THE STORY OF THE CYCLIST WHO CAPTIVATED EUROPE





His books configure a nonconformist and critical philosophy, not only in productivism of the technocratic model of our society, but also in the face of those spiritualist philosophies that, in an attempt to compensate it, end up using the same mentality. He is the author of the essays A hundred philosical questions (2017), Laziness (2019), You and George Orwell (2019), with which he won the XXVI Joan Maragall Essay Prize, and Philosophy for a worse life. Breviary of 20th Century Philosophical Pessimism (2021).





A STUDY ON THE EXPERIENCE OF DEATH AS A SOURCE OF INSPIRATION AND REFLECTION

In a society where consumerism prevails, death does not enjoy an intellectual-creative debate commensurate with its daily presence in the news, series, movies, or video games. Writing or creating about something as incomprehensible as death becomes almost a threat to this way of life while we are desensitized by its high exposure. Nevertheless, the unease and mystery surrounding it are the most powerful and recurrent leitmotifs in the history of European art, especially during the 20th century.

Germán Piqueras delves into the experience of death in artistic expression. Through personal diaries, interviews, and other texts, this essay describes the lives of eighteen artists—Edvard Munch, Käthe Kollwitz, Oskar Kokoschka, Charlotte Salomon, Francis Bacon, Juan Muñoz, or Marina Abramović, among others—for whom death has a transcendental meaning. Thus, themes such as mourning, destruction, war, the body, morality, and memory make their way through drawings, paintings, photographs, sculptures, and performances that help us understand European life and history in the 20th century.

The aim of this essay is to examine the interconnection between capitalism, patriarchy, and love to culminate in the identification of new forms of relationship and affection among people. The authors, in a lucid, entertaining, and well-documented manner, propose a historical journey through different types of love, highlighting the changes motivated by the socio-political situation of each moment. Likewise, they dissect aspects of couple love relationships: the contract and the false freedom of exchange, love as a fetish and love rituals, the ownership, commodification, and privatization of bodies, and sexual exclusivity. Finally, avoiding instructions, norms, or recipes, they propose a rhizomatic love, opening a dialogue about other viable paradigms of loving relationships that allow us to confront other ways of life.

The expression of the sordid in Goya, the myths of Mark Rothko, the negation of man in Franz Marc, the revenge of the political class of Thèodore Gericault and the tragic and sublime of William Turner are some of the messages that have come to us through art.


The author has chosen artists who accurately represent the path that Kooning speaks of, from the Paleolithic paintings of the Chauvet cave to the works of modern artists such as Picasso, Malcolm Morley, Mario Merz, Marlene Dumas, Louise Bourgeois, or Joseph Beuys. All of them have elements to introduce their work into dynamic artists: the gestural process, the firm stroke and the ancestral theme, as well as certain emotions such as freedom, violence, love or pacification through art.

In the literature of Jorge Luis Borges, there is a philosophical thread that all critics and scholars have sought and interpreted to better understand the work of one of the greatest writers of the 20th century. Miguel Antón Moreno is responsible for gathering those clues and reconstructing the scenarios of Borges' poetics: libraries, labyrinths, mirrors, felines, clocks, and knives. Interweaving the reflections of multiple writers, such as Julio Ramón Ribeyro, David Hume, Machiavelli, Hegel, Goethe, Kafka, Flaubert, Ortega y Gasset, Schopenhauer, Foster Wallace, or Ricardo Piglia, he offers us a new panorama of the symbols behind his writing and asks us: what is fiction? Thus, in this essay, Borges becomes the focus of concepts that invite us to question problems of our time: fame, canon, violence, science, dystopias, memory, or forgetting.

He has also published the chronicle-essay *Blanco móvil* (*Mobile White*, 2023), the poetry collection Gavia (Gavia, 2019), and the book of short stories Agua dura (Hard Water, 2013). His short stories appear in a dozen anthologies from Spain and Latin America. He writes articles for *Viajes National Geographic* and worked as a literary critic for the Culturas supplement of La Vanguardia, among other media.

History has made Berlin a city condemned to continuous change. Perhaps, more than any other contemporary city, Berlin offers itself as a jumble of superimposed traces whose language we must learn to decipher.

Ibon Zubiaur presents us with the back courtyards or Hinterhöfe, designed to take advantage of space and avoid segregation into rich and poor neighborhoods, but whose function changed due to the unbridled growth of the population. Likewise, the network of canals, the foundation of the city, has had much to do with the preservation of its design and its railway development. These elements contain stories that demand attention, the ability to listen, and above all, the most copious possible background of readings.



Being an Armenian means being a survivor: wars, invasions, earthquakes, massacres and a terrifying genocide that took a million and a half lives, according to their accounts.

This book talks about impossible stories, but true. Characters who raise the country today with much love and better humor. Virginia Mendoza enters their homes and shares a table with some of the last survivors of that genocide, she visits the Yazidis who worship Melek Taus, the Peacock Angel, or the Molokan Christians, who drink milk; talk to the widow of the builder of an underground temple to save humanity from the fire; she introduces us to Khachaturian's honorees and the granddaughter of a slave. Wise voices, sometimes full of melancholy, but always hopeful.

In Journey to the Kingdom of Ava, Leoncio Robles travels through Myanmar, formerly known as Burma, a country whose history records repeated frustrated struggles to gain access to freedom and democracy, and whose inhabitants have learned to live in constant instability. We know, for example, a descendant of the last Shan prince assassinated by the coup military, who discreetly divulges the legacy of his ancestor; and an old upper-class woman who altruistically teaches English to peasant children, convinced that education is the tool to conquer freedom. All this in the middle of a war that involves approximately fifteen ethnic groups.

Combining historical information and travel journals, Robles brings us closer to a reality as complex as it is fascinating. He shows us the consequences of more than fifty years of armed conflict. In these pages the image of the Myanmar of these times is condensed, through a story that represents horror and sadness, but also broken dreams and the promises of an enchanted land devoured by oblivion.



Suso Mourelo travels throughout Japan. He visits big cities and quiet rural enclaves, with the goal of discovering the places where the novels of his favorite authors took place. We roam the Tokyo of the accursed writer, Osamu Dazai or the small island of Kamishima that served as an inspiration for Yukio Mishima; the Kyoto of Junichirô Tanizaki's fetish stories or the mountain refuge in which Yasunari Kawabata set Snow Country. With this literary universe as a point of reference, the author wanders across the country, whilst engaging its people, living in the intimacy of their homes, and while he probes the circumstances of a society that is experiencing an amazing mutation. Mourelo creates a story that, in the manner of a long haiku, guides us through the literary memory by the sheer force of sensations and present-day images.

Hong Kong is a sacred monster, le monstre sacré, as Joseph Kessel warned us in 1955, when the city was a British colony that received daily hordes of refugees from inland China. Hong Kong, they say, is a poorly healed wound and the revelation of a melancholy that fascinates with the beauty with which it manifests itself. It is the melancholy that arises from a lost innocence, from a damaged time and space that no one is capable of fixing, and it is that malignancy that manifests itself in us when that innocent gaze that is so necessary for living is completely lost. Blas Piñero Martínez offers us an approach to that depressed Hong Kong that was considered dead and suddenly wakes up to devour us not without first seducing us with its unsettling beauty. Additionally, we are accompanied on this journey by the photographs of David J. Clarke, where the traces of inherited customs and signs that have contributed brilliance to the glorious Hong Kongese cultural tradition are perceived.
